THE CALL OF PLANET A: Sustainability and *Mars*

Luke Jerram's spectacular *Mars* installation has landed at the Cathedral this month. It is both an impressive artwork and a stark reminder of the lush beauty of the planet on which we live.

Jerram's *Mars* is the third of his astronomy-themed installations, following *Gaia* and *Museum of the Moon*. *Mars* offers an intimate encounter with the Martian surface, where visitors can explore each crater, valley, and volcano in exact detail. While *Mars* is often portrayed in popular culture as humanity's 'Plan B,' a place to escape from the problems on Earth, Jerram's installation challenges that notion. With its freezing, toxic, and uninhabitable conditions, *Mars* reminds us that there is no real substitute for Earth.

As part of our programme of events accompanying the *Mars* exhibition, we explore the theme of sustainability in various ways. Our Prayer and Spiritual Trail will encourage thoughtful reflection on our responsibility to care for Earth. We will also host a *Mars* Makers Art Workshop on Saturday 26th October, when children (and their enthusiastic adults) will step inside NASA for a special mission to create a spacecraft fit for travelling to Mars using various resources including recycled materials. Under-5s will engage with these same ideas at our storytelling sessions under *Mars*, exploring space and sustainability with stories and pictures.

As we approach the Cathedral's 950th anniversary in 2025, we reflect on centuries of faith, spirituality and community, but also look to the future. The legacy we create today will shape the next 950 years, and a crucial part of that legacy is our duty to care for God's creation. One of the key projects we are embarking on is to achieve Net Zero carbon by 2030.

Our environmental stewardship goals include reducing fossil fuel consumption, enhancing biodiversity through projects like the wild garden at the Deanery, and providing a space for communities to engage with both nature and environmental issues. Our Parish Energy Advisory Team supports local parishes by developing Net Zero plans, conducting audits, managing projects, and offering small grants to assist churches in delivering carbon reduction initiatives.

We have already made strides in our commitment to sustainability. In 2023, we installed a low energy lighting system, significantly reducing our electricity consumption. We are also working toward the Gold Eco Church Award, having achieved a Bronze award in 2018. This year, our bi-annual Festival of Flowers took a significant step towards sustainability by going foam-free, and unsold flowers were repurposed into confetti through a collaboration with the Confetti Club London or donated to local hospices.

Through meticulous planning and unwavering commitment, we aim to become an environmental flagship for the wider Diocese, making a meaningful contribution to safeguarding our planet.

We look forward to welcoming you to explore the awe-inspiring Martian landscape at Luke Jerram's *Mars* exhibition and invite you to join the conversation about the future of our Earth.

Mars

WHEN: 19th October – 10th November

WHERE: Cathedral Nave

The Cathedral will host artist Luke Jerram's immersive installation *Mars* from 19th October to 10th November 2024.

Measuring seven metres in diameter, the artwork features detailed NASA imagery of the Martian surface vaulted in the Nave of the Cathedral.

Each centimetre of the spherical sculpture represents ten kilometres of the surface of Mars with every valley, crater, volcano and mountain visible for visitors to explore.

The artwork will be on show at the Cathedral just after 150 years since the birth of celebrated Composer Gustav Holst, who is interred within the Cathedral's North Transept. Holst is best known for *The Planets*, a seven-movement orchestral suite, with each movement named after a planet of the Solar System - including Mars.

Mars was co-commissioned by Kunsthal KAdE, Netherlands; UK Space Agency; Science and Technology Facilities Council, UK and UK Association for Science and Discovery Centres. With supporting partner University of Bristol.

Nigel's choice of book is *The Shortest History of Migration* by Ian Goldin.

Nigel says: The story of humanity, profoundly reflected in the grand narratives of Genesis, is the story of migration. In recent history, millions left the British Isles to settle in North America, Australasia and elsewhere. The enterprise of empire has now given way to a world of migration, including large-scale migration into Europe, powered by economic change, war and climate-change.

In *The Shortest History of Migration*, Professor Goldin explores this vast canvas, now amplified with genetic research, and taking in the legacies of empire, slavery and war. How can humanity's legacy of the movement of populations be turned to our good? A South African-born economist, Professor Goldin is the director of the Oxford Martin Research Programmes on Technological and Economic Change, Future of Work and Future of Development.

‘Whatever Happened to Don Cupitt?: A Brief Stocktake of British Anglican Theology Today’

The Swiss Theologian Karl Barth once described English Theology as ‘Garden Gnome Theology’, but recent decades have seen several lively and internationally influential movements in British theology give the lie to this description. Similarly, even if Don Cupitt was right to remark on faith’s ‘long, withdrawing roar’ in the 1980s, his proposed non-realist response to that ebb has not found many disciples in the decades that have followed. Instead, a range of vigorous theological projects have flourished. In this talk, Professor Quash will examine some distinctively Anglican examples, including Radical Orthodoxy, various new experiments in natural theology (from David Brown to Alister McGrath), and the role of a Coleridgean tradition and of Scriptural Reasoning in an Anglican post liberalism.

Douai Abbey Retreat | The Mystery of Christ

The Rev Dr Earl Collins has kindly agreed to lead the Lent Retreat at Douai Abbey in Berkshire in March 2025. The retreat will run from 4pm on Thursday 6th March 2025 to 2pm on Sunday 9th March 2025. The theme of the retreat will be The Mystery of Christ. Christ as the revelation of God's Mystery is a key notion in the New Testament. This retreat will focus on how the Mystery was revealed in the main events of Christ's life and work. In each session we will look at three dimensions: the witness to the Mystery in Scripture, how the Church celebrates it in worship and what it means for the life and prayer of each Christian individually. The aim will be to contemplate Christ in his saving work, so as to draw closer to God. During this retreat we will consider:

- The Baptism of Christ

- The Transfiguration
- The Paschal Mystery
- The Ascension
- The Eucharist

The retreat will cost approximately (prices to be confirmed nearer the time) £250 plus VAT per person for a single room for full board for the three nights and £205 plus VAT per person for a shared room for full board for the three nights. The Cathedral is unable to provide transport to the Abbey but may be able to help to arrange car shares.

The next lecture of the 2024/2025 programme of the Worthing Theological Society will take place on Monday 28 October. Charles Crocker, poet and Cathedral Verger

In this illustrated talk Alan Green, Chichester's historian, explores the life and times of Charles Crocker interspersed with readings of some of his works.

Two of Chichester's Georgian poets – William Collins and William Hayley – are well known but the third, Charles Crocker, was until recently largely forgotten. Born in the city in 1797, apprenticed as a shoemaker, he had an innate love of literature and composed verses whilst he worked. More-fitting employment followed, first with a Chichester publisher and later as sexton and Bishop's Verger at the cathedral, a post he held until his death in 1861. His first slim volume of poems was published in 1830 and ran to a further three enlarged editions over the ensuing 30 years.

New Testament Travels in Greece

Our prayer for this edition of the Sunday News is written by Bishop Lancelot Andrewes. He was Bishop of Chichester from 1605 - 1609. The prayer appears in *A chain of prayer across the ages*, compiled by Selina Fitzherbert Fox and published by John Murray paperbacks (1971):

Thou God of providence,
grant to farmers and keepers of cattle good seasons:
to the fleet and fishers fair weather:
to tradesmen not to overreach one another;
to mechanics to pursue their business lawfully:
even down to the meanest workman,
even down to the poor;
for Christ's sake.

Amen
