ADVENT

Near the end of his letter to the persecuted church in Rome, St Paul writes, ‘The night is far spent, the day is at hand: let us therefore cast off the works of darkness, and...put on the armour of light’ (*Romans 12: 13*) – words which shape the first of the four majestic collects of Advent from the Book of Common Prayer that will mark our steps through this year’s Advent Procession.

Those words remind us that the condition of Advent is akin to that of the morning twilight: we are still in darkness but our eyes are fixed on the warmth on the horizon, the kind of dawn with which December is often so generous. In both the ancient world and Tudor England (when the prayer book was written), the long hours of darkness in the winter – unassisted by artificial light – would have shaped your life in a way unimaginable to us now. The lengthy night was a time of danger, licentiousness and violence – all of which stood in contrast to the light represented by Christ in the Gospels or indeed the new Jerusalem in which there is no need of sun or moon, as ‘the Lamb is the light thereof’ (*Revelation 21: 23*).

In this service, the longings of biblical Israel speak to our own desire to see light breaking on the horizon and the coming of one who will bring an end to humanity’s cycles of violence and oppression.

THE THIRD LESSON

The proclamation of John the Baptist.

In those days came John the Baptist, preaching in the wilderness of Judea, 'Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand.' For this is he who was spoken of by the prophet Isaiah when he said, 'The voice of one crying in the wilderness: Prepare the way of the Lord, make his paths straight.'

Now John wore a garment of camel's hair, and a leather girdle around his waist; and his food was locusts and wild honey. Then went out to him Jerusalem and all Judea and all the region about the Jordan, and they were baptized by him in the river Jordan, confessing their sins.

THE GOSPEL READING

The Lord be with you
All **and with thy spirit.**

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to St Matthew.
All **Glory be to thee, O Lord.**

The birth of Jesus the Messiah took place in this way. When his mother Mary had been engaged to Joseph, but before they lived together, she was found to be with child from the Holy Spirit. Her husband Joseph, being a righteous man and unwilling to expose her to public disgrace, planned to dismiss her quietly. But just when he had resolved to do this, an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, 'Joseph, son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary as your wife, for the child conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit. She will bear a son, and you are to name him Jesus, for he will save his people from their sins.' All this took place to fulfil what had been spoken by the Lord through the prophet: 'Look, the virgin shall conceive and bear a son, and they shall name him Emmanuel', which means, 'God is with us.'
